

Philippians 2:5-11

⁵Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, ⁶who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, 7but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, 8he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross. ⁹Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, 11 and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. By the time you read this,

no doubt we'll be fully immersed in Holy Week, which began on Palm Sunday. Paul's letter to the Philippians captures, I think, what Holy Week is about. Although Jesus experienced a joyous entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, the people cheering him on had dif-

ferent expectations for what his arrival would mean for them.

But Paul saw it differently, with the benefit of decades of hindsight. What's that expression? Hindsight is 20-20? Paul hits the ball out of the park, to borrow a baseball metaphor, pointing out that Jesus, born in human likeness and found in human form, humbled himself and gave his life on a cross. Christ suffered death for our sins.

And how should we respond? "... at the name of Jesus every knee should bend ... and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

These past 40 days during our journey through Lent gave us the opportunity to reflect on God's covenants throughout the Old Testament. God's commitments, God's agreements, God's contracts with his people. And throughout history,

even though God's people made bad choices and turned away from God, God never gave up on God's people. God wants very much to be in relationship with God's people, no matter how stubborn, indifferent, or oppositional we might be. How does God's love manifest itself in your life? How do you witness to our Risen Savior who lives and reigns now and forever? Christ is risen!



"I was sick and you stopped to visit" from Matthew 25: 36, "The Message" study Bible translated by Eugene Peterson).

"Coming soon" could have been an alternate title for this short article, but the basis, found in the 25th chapter of Matthew, provides perhaps a better explanation. Late last year, many of our members responded to Council President Bob Horton's request that they complete a time and talent sheet. The survey allowed each participant to indicate how they'd like to (or validate where they already do) contribute to the life of the congregation and its mission.

A handful expressed interest in serving our folks who no longer can attend worship or may be hospitalized. That's *in addition* to the pastoral care coverage I'm able to provide as your part time interim pastor—*not instead of* me (though I suspect many of those who receive visits will enjoy them even more than from me, who's only known them the past year-plus. It's happened elsewhere).

During April, the handful of volunteer visitors and I will get together to go over a few details such as the short liturgy for visiting and communion, the logistics for consecrating the elements, obtaining communion kits, and scheduling. Currently there are almost a dozen of our members whom I visit monthly in their homes, plus recently a few more who are hospitalized and/or in rehabilitation facilities. Most of the current folks seem enthusiastic about the prospect of a visit with another member of Trinity, perhaps even someone they've know for many years but not talked to recently. This program will launch after Easter this spring and strengthen a sense of community among the family of Trinity. If you also would like to participate, please contact me at ajsaat96@gmail.com.

Life arising from death and destruction is Earth's song of hope and God's song of love. Hope and love are the food of life.

Although we do not intend harm, our ways of life are killing people through climate change and through enslaving them in mines and plantations, poisoning their water or selling it on the global market Through myriad forms of ecological degradation we are disrupting a fundamental quality of God's garden – its life-generating capacity. We are un-creating.

Yet the truth of our participation in structural evil is only a partial truth. Moral vision that recognizes structural evil has a second lens that sees signs of hope breaking through the wasteland of economic and ecological violence. Hope springs eternal from the courage, tenacity, and creativity of people and movements [around the world].

The call to love as an economic and ecological vocation is ... the reorienting of human life to render it sustainable on this planet home.... In this reorientation we are called by God and by life itself to celebrate, relish, and stand in awe of Earth's beauty, unfolding complexity and life-generating goodness.

Dr. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda holds a joint appointment at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary and Church Divinity School of Pacific, in Berkeley, CA. She has lectured or consulted in Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, and many parts of North America in theological ethics addressing matters of economic globalization, public church, faith-based resistance to systemic injustice, and ethical implications of resurrection and incarnation. Of particular interest in her teaching is climate justice as related to race and class. She is the author of Resisting Structural Evil: Love as Ecological-Economic Vo-

Dr. Moe-Lobeda was appointed theological consultant to the Presiding Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and has served as a church worker in Honduras and as director of the Washington, D.C. office of Augsburg College's Center for Global Education.

Prior to her current appointment, she served on the faculty of Seattle University in its School of Theology and Ministry, Department of Theology and Religious Studies, and Environmental Studies Program. While at SU, she was appointed Wismer Professor of Gender and Diversity Studies, and was awarded the "Outstanding Scholarship Award" in 2013. Dr. Moe-Lobeda's teaching revolves around participatory liberative pedagogy, developing critical thinking skills, and the integration of theory and practice.

Dr. Moe-Lobeda serves on the board of directors of the Society of Christian Ethics. She received her doctoral degree in Christian ethics from Union Theological Seminary in New York City.
