

It's offered to you this month and is based on the second reading, found in  $2^{nd}$  Corinthians 4:3-6 <sup>3</sup>Even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are

perishing. <sup>4</sup>In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. <sup>5</sup>For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. <sup>6</sup>For it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

Grace and peace to you from God our Creator and our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Amen. Today marks the end of the season of Epiphany, when God revealed Jesus to the world. We heard the story of Jesus' baptism in the River Jordan by John, with the Holy Spirit coming in the form of a dove and God declaring this is my beloved son, in whom I am well pleased. And in today's Gospel, we again hear the voice of God calling out this is my Son, the Beloved. And this time also an admonition, an instruction, if you will, to Jesus' followers there on the mountain: *listen to him!* I invite you to hold that thought.

Now we prepare to enter the season of Lent. Lent is a difficult time of year for many of us, I suspect. It's a time when some of us will be subdued, sad, reflective, penitent, and a time when many Christians practice self-denial. But before we get ahead of ourselves and launch into Lent on Ash Wednesday, we have the Transfiguration, this moment of glory, when Jesus' clothing is described as *dazzling white*. Isn't this the Jesus we want to hold on to, to keep with us throughout the next six weeks? It's the vision of Jesus in all his glory, not the one we'll see on Good Friday, again on a mountain, but this time Golgotha, or Calvary, dying on a cross. We want, as Paul said, for the light to shine out of darkness. This is the one who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

Oh, but were it just this easy to accomplish. It's not that easy in this time or place, is it? Just as in Paul's time, we know there's plenty of gods of this world to blind us and those around us from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. Paul uses the image of a veil, which we know is something used to conceal or cover up an object from being revealed or made known. What can you think of as the veils of the world in which we live that blind us from seeing the light of the gospel, of the glory of Christ? I can think of a bunch. No doubt you can name several in your mind too. Yet as believers and followers of Christ, we, like Paul, have a different perspective, the gift of faith given at baptism through the Holy Spirit. Paul wrote that *we do not* proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and we are his servants. Martin Luther's explanation to the third article of the Creed says it well: I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the

Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith. In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith.

Last week I spent some time looking at the church archives. One set of entries was especially noteworthy. Many of you appreciate the significance of the date January 19, 1929. It was the afternoon and evening that the old church building at 4<sup>th</sup> at Tyler burned to the ground. Imagine what a blow that was to the congregation. There were a few more significant dates that year, ones that affected more than the members of Trinity Lutheran Church. On March 25 of that year there was a correction to the stock market, and of course, on Black Thursday, October 24, the stock market crashed, setting off more than a decade of economic hardship in our country. The first dust bowl struck the following year, that further worsened the plight of many Americans.

Yet the fire that devastated the congregation of Trinity Lutheran church in 1929 didn't diminish the spirit of its members. In fact, they pulled together for a common cause, and just over a year later, in March of 1930, a new church building was dedicated on our current site. Obviously the Holy Spirit was at work in the hearts and minds of the members then, nearly 90 years ago.

I wonder how the members of Trinity would respond if they could join us for worship today. I wonder what those leaders would think and say if they saw the church today. I'm not just talking about the attendance at worship, or the financial reports from recent years, or the push-pin map we completed last year showing where the membership lives. I'm also talking about what's going on, not just on Sunday mornings, but also the rest of the week, here at 8<sup>th</sup> and Buchanan as well as in the community, the neighborhood in which Trinity resides.

In his book entitled The Mission Table Stephen Bouman, executive director of Evangelical Outreach and Congregational Mission for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, wrote about the practice of the Roman Empire when their boats reached the shore of Britain. It is said the Romans dragged their boats ashore and burned them on the beach. The message was clear: we are here to stay. Bouman posits that a congregation expending its resources, imagination, and leadership to reconnect to its community and to set a new mission table needs to have a burning our boats at the shore commitment.

Make no mistake—there are congregations in our Synod with far fewer active members attending worship on Sunday mornings that are thriving. Not necessarily growing in numbers, but congregations having discerned a clear sense of mission and actively doing God's work for the life of the world. They do it, as former Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson wrote on Pentecost five years ago, because we believe our neighbors deserve to hear the good news of God's love for them.

Remember what God told Jesus' disciples on the mountain in our Gospel today: to listen? It's the promise you heard here a year ago-that we would listen to God's word, listen to each other, and listen to those around us. And much of that has happened since the transition task force began meeting and hosting town hall meetings and the adult forum last year. Yet I wonder whether this congregation is willing to reroot the life of Trinity in the life of its community. I wonder whether this congregation has the courage to see old things die and risk new things being born

Pr. Mamy left notes in the pastor's

study from a task force that began its work just over two years ago in January 2016. The members of the task force clearly identified trends and the realities of where the church was heading. Yet comparing those notes to today, two years later, it appears that very little has changed, other than average attendance having dropped on the average by a few each week.

I'm not suggesting that Trinity needs another burn to the ground or boat burning re-enactment at Lake Shawnee. Old Testament scholar Walter Brueggemann, however, wrote that the massive and unarguable dislocation of the conventional church may be an occasion for a common resubmission to the power or God's spirit. May God guide our path and give us the courage to shine that light in Historic Old Town. Amen.
