Pastor Alan's Column



2 Corinthians 8:7-15 Now as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you—so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking. 8I do not say this as a command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others. 9For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. ¹⁰And in this matter I am giving my advice: it is appropriate for you who began last year not only to do something but even to desire to do something-11 now finish doing it, so that your eagerness may be matched by completing it according to your means. 12 For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has—not according to what one does not have. ^{13}I do not mean that there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a

fair balance between 14 your present abundance and their need, so that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be a fair balance. 15 As it is written, "The one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little."

Abundance—what does that word mean? The dictionary says it's having "more than you need." It's often used to describe positive qualities, such as "an abundance of love." This noun comes from the 14th century French, via the Latin abundantia, meaning "fullness, plenty." Paul writes to us about our attitude toward giving. He writes about, as Pastor/ professor Mark Allan Powell describes it, seeing the sharing of our gifts as both a duty to give, but also a delight: "but even to desire to do something—11now finish doing it, so that your eagerness may be matched by completing it according to your means. 12For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has—not according to what one does not have."

Our society today views abundance in materialistic terms—how much money in our bank accounts and investment funds, or the "stuff" we've accumulatedhomes, cars, clothes, etc. One could argue that no matter who we are or how much we "own" everyone gets the same allocation of one thing on earth—time. Yep, rich or poor, we all get the same number of hours each week, 24 hours a day, seven days a week= 168 hours. How do we use that abundance of time? The most common activity that consumes a plurality of hours is what we all needsleep. But how about the waking hours? God wants us to be good stewards of our person, so that includes nourishment, hydration, and cleanliness. If you take out 10 hours a day for these three tasks, it still leaves us about 14 hours a day or nearly 100 hours a week to do ... what? How do we choose to use that abundance of time?

God so loved the world, He gave us grandchildren!



Dear Friends,

I bring greetings from Pastor Tom Schaeffer who served Trinity several years ago. The occasion for our meeting was the celebration of Dr. Jennifer Schaeffer Sparrow's doctoral degree celebration held recently in Singapore. Jennifer is now the Deputy Superintendent of Singapore American School, the largest and most prestigious international school in the world. As a fellow graduate of Topeka West High School, I was honored to be on Jennifer's doctoral committee and also to be the commencement speaker at the University of Southern California international doctoral degree ceremony in Singapore.

Jennifer is already a leading international educator and, I am sure, will be a globally recognized scholar and writer in the future. Topeka has produced many great students!

Pastor and Mrs. Schaeffer fondly remember the faithful members of Trinity, and as happened so often in my international travels, it takes only "one degree of separation" to find people we know in common, from the many choir members, musicians, council members, and leaders of Trinity, and many, many others. Never doubt that your kindnesses and appreciations, however small and incidental, to a pastor and spouse, are recalled with gratitude decades after you offer those expressions of thanks.

Pastor Tom continues to serve the Lord by mentoring a community of Benedictine brothers in the Anglican Church. He is, as many of you probably know, a thoughtful scholar, teacher, and pastor. It was an honor to meet him and Mrs. Schaeffer and to take their greetings to you.

I am a loyal subscriber to Trinity Tidings and am very grateful that this faithful congregation continues to serve Topeka. I know that my parents, Jean and Julie Reeves, are very proud of the work of the congregation serving the neighborhood, the youth, the Lord, and those that most need to hear the Word and receive the sacraments. You are all doing important work that is insufficiently appreciated and recognized, and it's a rare opportunity for me, as both a Topeka native and now an outsider, to simply say "thanks for all that vou do."

From my home in Boston, I continue to write (38 books and counting) and teach and mentor doctoral candidates around the world. I also serve school systems - particularly the most poor and needy, from Africa and Asia to California and New York and every county in-between. You may know that my brothers, Andrew and Steve, have served the country and the world, Andy as a philanthropist who has built schools and hospitals in Africa and Steve, who served for almost 40 years with distinction in the Army and retired as a Major General. We were all baptized in Trinity Lutheran Church. I doubt that the pastors that baptized us or the Sunday school teachers that taught us foresaw such a future. If there is a meaning to the term "saint" then Eleanora and Willie Martin and the others who taught us deserve that title. The same is true of so many Trinity leaders who influenced our lives and futures.

I regret that I am not in Topeka more often, but along with Pastor Tom, I send my greetings from about 15,000 miles away.

Synod Assembly Report

Being chosen to represent Trinity Lutheran at the 2018 ELCA Central States Synod Assembly was an honor. The experience was reenergizing for me on a personal level and I hope that energy will show through in my application to our congregation of the knowledge I gained.

I attended two workshops while at the assembly, however, one titled *Evangelism begins with B* stood out specifically to me. My biggest take away from it was that before we can expect people to value our guidance as a congregation to

behave and believe in what we consider to be God's path, we must first make sure that they feel they belong. I think that putting belonging first in our process of assimilation will greatly increase the chance of new members being introduced to Trinity.

I greatly appreciate the opportunity extended to me and I hope that I will be able to apply everything I learned in a helpful way.

This was my first time to attend the CSS Assembly and the fact that it was in Lindsborg was a bonus! It was a joy to have Parker Jackson attend also. I loved getting to know him a bit better.

I won't bore you with reciting the events as they happened, but there are some items worth noting.

- Vice President Dennis Allerheiligen said there will be a survey done in the fall by the nominating committee for upcoming elections. <u>Any member of a CSS congregation can nominate someone for bishop.</u>
- Team 500reported there is more money available for trees. They will also be doing a survey in the fall, along with dinner meetings. Two items to keep in mind!
- Workshop #1 Evangelism in the City: What Can We All Learn? I wish that some of our council and Witness/Outreach committee members could have been at this workshop. St. Mark's on Troost Avenue in Kansas City is an example of a thriving church (early 1900s) that fell into decline (1950s thru early 2000s) and is now somewhat rejuvenated after a merger. Trinity is having some similar challenges and may be facing a similar choice for survival. Donna provided some resource information which I will share with anyone who asks.
- Workshop #2 God's Story in Creation: This Changes Everything. In this workshop, ways to "green" the church were presented, everything from reusable coffee cups to cars. In one church in Missouri, the local electric company changed all of their lighting to LED at no charge! I've

liked the Lutherans Restoring Creation Facebook page on our Facebook page so you can go there to read more about it.

- During the Friday evening banquet, several familiar persons were honored for their years of service in ministry: Jennifer Jackson—5 years; Shawn Norris—30 years; Susan Candea—35 years; and Charles Hanson was honored for 65 years though he was not in attendance. (BTW, he lives at Atria.)
- The final session happened on Saturday morning. I found it heartening that there was a motion from the floor to increase the synod budget over what was proposed. Treasurer Scott Schulte had presented the proposed budget on Friday, explaining why line items were reduced or not increased. The motion from the floor increased the budget by about \$20,000 for campus ministry & seminary support, and was approved by a vote of members present.
- Also during the Saturday meeting, several resolutions were presented and approved. You can read about them in the Central States E-News that was forwarded on June 21st. And you will be seeing some bulletin inserts, etc., in the coming months.

If you've ever attended this meeting at Bethany in the past and found that Hahn Gym (where most of the meetings are held) was a bit on the warm side (June in Kansas, after all)— well that has changed. Hahn Gym is now air-conditioned! Bring a sweater!
