In the opening of "Fiddler on the Roof," we are brought into the story of the village of Anatevka by the boosterish singing of "Tradition" by Tevya and his family. The irony of this song is that while Tevya has a static concept of Tradition—to do things as they have always been done—we find in the conflicts with his daughters and the changes of greater society that Tevya is forced to create a new concept of Tradition that allows for movement. This is most wildly demonstrated in the wedding of Motel and Tzeitel where the ropes are tak-

ing down and the men and women dance in joy for the blessing of God on this new union. Even the most conservative person, the Rabbi, whips out his handkerchief to spin around with the young ladies, an action that was normally forbidden.

Tradition is a funny thing in many ways for it can both be joyful or dreadful. Why does this happen? As Tevya finds out, tradition cannot be bottled up and kept the way it has always been. If that happens, it becomes separated from the people and the reality

that we all live in. It takes the input, adaptation, and changes of each generation to take these traditions and give them new meaning for our lives. While we like to think that traditions always stay the same, even traditions such as worship, the history of humanity has shown that we never do that great at keeping things exactly as they "have always been." Sometimes, we have to let tradition die and spring up in new ways that makes sense in our modern life.

Doorstep News - October 2019

Thank you to everyone who participated in our Fall Fundraisers by joining us at the Walk/5K Run, or buying tamales and cinnamon rolls! Every little bit helps, and with our recent basement flooding the funds are greatly needed to replenish our account!

If you haven't heard, Doorstep's basement was flooded on August 30th by a City sewer back-up. This was blamed on the heavy rainfall that morning. And, insurance did not cover the expense of the cleanup and repair (roughly \$18,000), and the loss of at least one-third of our Christmas Store donations we had collected. We have the basement nearly back in order, with pallets lining all of the sort and storage rooms.

As we prepare for the over 800 individuals we will adopt for Christmas, there are specific items we know we lost, and others we always need.

We know we need blankets (queen & king), school supplies and backpacks, children's toys, new winter clothing for boys and girls sizes 6-16, men and women, and household items such as crockpots, coffee makers, sheets (queen & king), dishes, pots and pans, etc.

Start watching those pre-holiday sales and help Doorstep where you can this Christmas. You can bring donations Monday – Friday from 8am – 3pm. We are located at 1119 SW 10th Avenue (10th & Buchanan). Please let us know when you have donations specifically for Christmas.

The Christmas Store will be December 8th – 12th this year, and we'll need volunteers all week long to help us out! Watch for the flyers coming soon!
