"Now if a deadly pestilence strikes, we should stay where we are, make our preparations, and take courage in the fact that we are mutually bound together so that we cannot desert one another or flee from one another. This is a time that God uses to test our faith and love — our faith in that we may see and experience how we should act toward God; our love in that we may recognize how we should act toward our neighbor." Martin Luther in 1527 to the pastors of Breslau facing the Bubonic Plaque

Our society is starting the process of reopening regardless of not finding a way to halt the virus, produce a vaccine, or create herd immunity. We are going out into a world where we are still estimating 4-5% of Americans have gotten the virus (primarily in major urban areas) and settling with the tragedy that even with that small amount of cases overall, we have already reached 100,000 deaths in our nation alone. That fact can seem crazy when faced with the reality that in our own setting, we have yet to really see the virus hit like it has in other places (even within our own state as the Kansas City suburbs and Wichita were both hit far greater than Topeka.)

For our churches opening up in the Central States Synod, Bishop

Candea has asked that each congregation create a plan for moving forward before opening their physical spaces. Spanning two states with congregations in both urban and rural contexts, the Synod knows that each of our congregations are going to be welcoming people back into the church building in different ways. Some congregations will be worshiping online for longer periods of time, some are trying worship outdoors, and others are having multiple small services during the week to allow for cleaning and social distancing. We are all tackling this challenge and wondering what our church will look like during this uncertain time.

Therefore, I hope you will take time to look at the plan created for our congregation. In various meetings with Synod leadership and with valuable insight from Church Council, this plan will help us move forward by using the best guidelines provided by the ELCA and the Synod. I would like to stress that this is a "working" plan. This means that moving forward we might need to change parts or adapt to what is happening. For instance, we would love for the virus outbreak to continue to decrease everyday

moving forward, but that most likely will not be the case and it will look more like a wave. So we might get to our second benchmark but have to move back to the first if there is a spike. The key for us moving forward is to remember to be flexible, to be in communication if you do not understand, and to be a people full of grace for none of us have the answers to what our future holds

Yet, what we can take hold of is the words of Luther during his experience with a pandemic. To keep close during these times our sense of Faith and Love. Faith in God that God will carry us through these times and give our leaders the insight to make just decisions for the good of all people. Love that is bounded by the promise that we have made as Christians to love our neighbors and to care for the least of these in our society during these times. Luther reminds us that regardless of the times, we have to keep in the center of our lives faith and love to have any hope for the future.


150th Anniversary Celebration!!


Save the date...

Trinity Lutheran Church Plan for Operations And Worship During the 2020 Pandemic

"God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in time of trouble. Therefore we will not fear..."

Psalm 46:1-2

Introduction

This document is intended to be a guide for reopening the church building and resuming our life as a congregation during this ongoing pandemic. This guide has been brought together considering the guidelines provided by the State, the Synod, and ELCA. As the situation develops, this guide will be amended to the regulations of our state or church governing bodies. This guide will follow phases of reopening that are dependent on declining case numbers as required by our Synod and ELCA guidelines.

(14 Days of Declining Cases)*

- Office will resume normal business hours
- Make available Zoom abilities for community groups that cannot meet.
- Groups of 10 or less are allowed meetings in building if they are church related such as council and committees. All in-person meetings are required to have sign-in for contact tracing.
- Worship
 - ♦ Online partnership with 1st Lutheran or other online format

(28 Days of Declining Cases)

- Groups of less than 10 are allowed to meet in building including community organizations with contact tracing.
- Worship
 - Online worship format continued
 - In-person worship on Wednesday afternoons (garden/parking lot worship) possibility with face mask and social distancing plan
 - ♦ Those 65 or older or with health concerns are asked to stay home



(42 Days of Declining Cases)

- Worship
 - ♦ Worship on Sundays (Service of Word)
 - Instrumental music only
 - Face mask required
 - Safety pathway
 - open door path (entering by new annex)
 - washing or sanitizing hands to enter
 - 6-feet spacing in pews by family/individual
 - * all pews sanitized after worship
 - Safety during worship
 - * self-serve bulletin station
 - offering plate is not passed
 - * peace by waving to neighbors
 - Those 65 or older or with health concerns are asked to stay home
 - This service will become the recorded online service. Recorded on Sundays and posted by that afternoon.

(56 Days of Declining Cases)

- Return to Normal Operations (This does not mean that everything will return to how it was before. We will follow guidelines as set by church and state to maintain safety of our members until a vaccine has been produced. We will just be returning as much as possible to normal operations and worship at this point.)
- All community groups are allowed with safety plan and contact tracing.
- Possible limitations on worship during this time
 - ♦ Any of the limitations given for previous services apply.
 - ♦ Those 65 or older or with health concerns are welcomed
 - ♦ Return to Communion
 - Receive by aisle (to avoid multiple contact by altar railing)
 - Return to congregational singing
 - Start with 4-6 person choir for vocal music for a period
 - Congregational singing will be reintroduced once safe again.

^{*}Days will be determined by data provided by Shawnee Co Health Department. Congregation will receive notice of our count of days by email for every 7 day period.
