...And Noah Returns to the Earth (Genesis 8: 6-12)

⁶At the end of forty days Noah opened the hatch of the ark that he had made, ⁷ and he released a raven. It flew back and forth until the waters dried off from the earth. 8 Then he released a dove, to see if the waters had lessened on the earth. 9But the dove could find no place to perch, and it returned to him in the ark, for there was water over all the earth. ¹⁰He waited yet seven days more and again released the dove from the ark. 11 In the evening the dove came back to him, and there in its bill was a plucked-off olive leaf! So Noah knew that the waters had diminished on the earth. 12 He waited yet another seven days and then released the dove: but this time it did not come back.

When I read this passage about Noah from the book of Genesis, I can't help think of how much we share in common with him during our times. In many ways, we are in "Ark Time." We are in an ark as a church but we also are in our own little arks at home deciding for ourselves what is best for our spouses, children, and family during this time. A time of waiting and not knowing if the Earth will come back to us the way we left it. Not knowing if there will be firm ground to place our feet on solid as stone. We find ourselves questioning if this is the right time to "reopen." Where are our doves to send out to test the waters?

There is a good chance that if things hold steady in Shawnee County, then we might start the process of "reopening" this month according to our plan. That will mean Sunday worship outside like a good ole tent revival and the resumption of small groups/committees in the church. Yet, what does "reopening" look like during these times? The truth of the matter is that churches will not be the same. Many of those we love will still be at home due to age or health issues. We are bound to see new people as those that have seen us online come to visit us. It might take a long while before Sunday worship attendance is back to our average. In fact, one of the major centers of church research, called the Alban Institute, forecast in their surveys that over 30% of church members across denominations do not see returning to church this year. Another study from the Center for Healthy Congregations at Belmont University (Baptist) is estimating that 5% of our churches will close this next year due to the pandemic with hindsight that if the pattern continues over 1/3 of our congregations will disappear by 2025 (with small congregations hit the hardest).

In July, we will tread the path that Noah demonstrates in his story. We will be trying our own versions of letting the dove out. The church will begin to come back to normalcy in some areas. We have to remember that just like Noah, our first time releasing the dove might not work out. We might find that the flood of this pandemic is too high and have to modify our plans moving forward to have the safety of all our members at the forefront. I have seen the reports of churches that have opened up, including some in Kansas, that have brought not only sickness to their members but death already this year. My love for each and everyone of you is too great to bear the thought of this happening to us. Yet, we have to move forward and find out how God is calling us to be Church in this moment. On Noah's third time releasing the dove, the dove doesn't return. As they used to sing, "it has found a nest for her own" or in other words it had found its way back home. And that will be our journey together as church these next couple of months. To find our way back home here at Trinity with all our loved family and friends.

- ◆ A Cair Paravel student has asked to use our sanctuary to do some filming for a project. More information is requested.


150th Anniversary Celebration!!

This July we are rolling all of our summer events into one month! We have Christmas in July collections for our adopted families this December, our 2nd Annual Summer Cash Bash, and this year Doorstep is the Envista Cares charity for July!

Last December Doorstep assisted 277 households involving 883 individuals with Christmas gifts and food. Each year we celebrate "Christmas in July" to get a jump start on collecting new items for our annual Christmas adoption! Our goal is to help alleviate some of the strain during the holidays by also collecting items midyear. Doorstep will adopt 260 households with 800+ individuals this December through the Christmas Bureau. Our focus for Christmas in July is household items, health kit items, toys, school supplies, gifts for men and women, sheet sets, and blankets. These are items that are not seasonal, and easy to find this time of year! The families we adopt are in need of basic items. They are so happy to receive a new set of dishes, new sheets, pots and pans, or a crockpot! We give every family a blanket or quilt.

Each school aged child we adopt receives school supplies and a backpack, and each household receives a health kit filled with hygiene products, and wrapped with a new bath towel, hand towel and washcloth! Each child receives one bigger toy as their gift, and other smaller items are available along with games, books, stuffed animals, stocking stuffers etc.

You can bring your Christmas donations to worship in July (if your congregation is open), or to Doorstep, Monday – Friday, 8am – 3pm.

Our 2nd Annual Summer Cash Bash has the same anonymous donor offering up \$8,000 in match money if we can raise \$20,000 during the month of July in donations! And, to make it even better...Envista Credit Union is making Doorstep the Envista Cares charity in July, and will match \$2,500 in donations!
