A Note from Pastor Andrew

"Be tolerant with each other and, if someone has a complaint against anyone, forgive each other. As the Lord forgave you, so also forgive each other." Colossians 3:13 As we approach a time when the vaccine is being distributed to our communities and life may slowly return to normal, we might have a rosy picture of what is ahead compared to the past year. It is true that some parts of church life will be coming back, but it will still be a while before we truly return to normal. We are faced with multiple messages as our denomination, our health officials, and our local government all offer different requirements. This is already happening as I am writing this message to you today. Therefore, there will be disagreements as we figure out what is right for us to do moving forward. We will not agree with some decisions. Some might stay home longer while others will be at church at the first opportunity.

Yet, while we might find ourselves in debate and disagreement, it does not mean we cannot do that in a faithful manner. As Paul outlines in Colossians 3:13,

we will have moments as when we will not see eye to eye. Despite this, the scripture lays out a way that we can move forward through conflict. First, we must be tolerant and kind to one another. Regardless of our disagreements with others, with the Council, or with the Pastor, we are doing our best in these difficult moments, but we will mess up along the way. Second, make your views known. If bottling up conflict or emotion was an Olympic sport, I know Trinity would have some gold medal winners. Those of us in leadership in the church cannot be mindful of things that need to be fixed or resolved if we never hear about them. Then finally, lets forgive each other and give some grace during. I always think of the confession where it states that we ask forgiveness for things that we have done knowingly and unknowingly.

I want to stress to you the realities of leading the church when multi-

ple and conflicting things are happening with the virus. The Synod has advised since January that we remain with online worship only. The ELCA this past month sent out a threestep guideline for reopening that is related to number of cases in our county. It is apparent with the transfer of leadership in the local health agencies, that the government is pushing to get things reopened as fast as possible even if it means that it is not safe. Then, you can add that some congregations, particularly in rural areas, never closed and act like nothing ever happened. I tell you this because in the next couple of months, we might be at a different place than other people or churches with regard to reopening the doors. But in those moments, just remember the path laid out by Paul. Be Kind, Let Your Voice Be Heard, and Forgive Others while we figure out the next steps for our church.
