Pastor's Letter

"The end of something is better than its beginning. Patience is better than arrogance. Don't be too quick to get angry because anger lives in the fool's heart. Don't ask, "How is it that the former days were better than these?" Wisdom is as good as an inheritancean advantage for those who see the sun..." Ecclesiastes 7:8-11 At a Synod small congregation vitality meeting, I was a panelist with other church leaders on a discussion of what the church can do looking forward. What has COVID taught small congregations and how might we use what we have gained in the future? One of the topics that came up was that our congregations often are not ready or willing to change until they find themselves forced to do so. This is a natural tendency not only in the church, but for all human organizations. We call it "social preservation" in sociological terms, meaning that when we gather, we favor the stability of having or doing what we have always done over accepting the fact that things have changed. Yet, we know that all organizations, if they are to continue to thrive and grow, must adapt to the realities with which they are faced. We would not wake up in the morning to a bowl of cereal if it wasn't for Kellogg encouraging his brother that his sanitarium food would be good for everyone. We would not be able to order

everything from Amazon if they had not changed their mission from selling books to becoming the general store of the world. All organizations have to adapt to stay relevant to their times and to their mission.

As we reopen, I hope you will see a difference in how we are working as a church. You have already seen that the Church Council took time to lay out what we want to do as a church. The Church Council has four priorities for this next year. I hope you will see more direct leadership from Council members as they bring new ideas and lead us toward what our congregation needs to focus on. The priorities for this year will be the 150th/151st Anniversary, Young Families and Youth, Updating Facilities, and Spiritual Care for Members.

Another change is our committee format. Even as a small church, we had 11 committees and over 60 committee and volunteer positions to maintain. The standard rule in congregational management is that in well-functioning congregations, 20% of the members are involved in administrative or organizational activities. We were working at almost 150% for some people in our congregation. Our committees would make sense for a church that was 200-300 members and I know we were once that church. The Ecclesias-

tes passage warns us that we are often frustrated or angry that we are not what we have been in the past. We have overworked ourselves in order to maintain a system of committees that no longer works for the church or for members who have to serve double or triple duty to keep things going. Therefore, Church Council had a discussion about this over two meetings to think about what a smaller committee structure would look like. After thoughtful reflection, it was agreed that we need to change the number and function of committees. As we begin church meetings in the month of June, I ask that all members please consider staying after church on June 6th so that we can have a conversation about our new committee structure. We will meet right after worship so you can stay in your pew. As pastor, I want to ensure that the congregation understands the changes and let you know how to get involved. As the Ecclesiastes passage tells us, wisdom is only an advantage to those that are seeking the sun and looking to the future instead of holding on to the past. My hope is that through reorganizing our committees, we can start our bright future as a church that is more missional and focused in the ministries that we carry out.
