

Pastor's Letter

"Salt is good; but if salt loses its saltiness, how will it become salty again? Maintain salt among yourselves and keep peace with each other." -Mark 9:50

We often forget the importance of salt in the days of the disciples. It was not only used to enhance the flavor of the food but was the primary means of preserving food in the days before refrigeration. Salt could be worth its weight in gold in some parts of the Roman Empire unlike how we spend pennies on the stuff and think nothing of accidentally spilling the shaker on our table. We just sweep it into the trash or some throw it over their shoulders for the more superstitious among us. If the Romans would see how we think of salt today, they certainly would have a heart attack over how little regard we have for those little grains of flavor.

Jesus in this passage is confronting his disciples for creating rules about how to be a follower of Christ that Jesus did not approve. They were busy trying to make a name for themselves and setting up a church that worked according to man's will, not God's will. Therefore, Jesus reminds them that in their faith together, they

must remember the roots of their faith. They must stay salty in their faith; they must stay true with their faith for the world to know them as followers of Christ. Another point of this metaphor to think about is not losing our saltiness, but what happens when we have too much salt. There always comes a point when the flavor that is added with salt gets lost. A point where you no longer are enjoying the food but reaching for a glass of water to clear your mouth of the mineral taste left from too much salt. Too much salt can create as much of a problem as having too little salt. Therefore, our challenge in our faith through this example is that we have to be mindful to always keep our faith at the center of our lives but at the same time, we must be open to accepting that our ways of practicing our faith need some variation.

Therefore, these next two months we are going to try to connect with some of our passions in faith as a congregation and try other ways of praising God on Sunday. On the last Sundays of October and November, we will try new ways of worshiping together. On the last Sunday in October, (see page 2) we will be incorporating

a less formal, family-friendly, and interactive worship service oriented toward the little ones in our congregation. Our care for the children in our congregation is always a highlight of our faith life when we can get all of our families together. This will hopefully we the start for thinking about creating more family focused Sundays next year. In November, the last Sunday will be oriented toward our service to our community. Or as we say in the ELCA, doing "God's Work, Our Hands." We will plan on having morning prayer at church and working with our food ministry on bringing muchneeded food to our neighbors during the holiday season. We have always had a deep passion for giving and serving our neighbors in need and if we enjoy this way of being church, we might think about dedicating a Sunday each month to worshiping God in our action in the community. Therefore, may we take these two Sundays and explore our faith and how to worship as a community in new light; connecting the passions of our faith as a congregation with the worship of God.

Doorstep is planning how we will operate our Christmas Store this year.

We will adopt 260 households with 800+ individuals from the Christmas Bureau as we do every year. How distribution will be handled is being planned, and we will update our member congregations as we know more.

We are now through the first quarter of our 55th Anniversary year, and donations for the 55th Anniversary Fund to replace our HVAC have brought in over \$31,000 so far. We feel incredibly blessed to have received this amount! We need at least another \$129,000 to replace the HVAC system which is

60+ years old. Anything over the HVAC amount will go to help more of our neighbors in need with basic needs such as rent and utility assistance. We are asking our supporters to donate a minimum of \$55 per person towards our 55th Anniversary Fund...

Food Ministry

At the September Council meeting, it was approved that a budget line item be added to collect funds that can be used to provide food to people that come to our door. Some memorial funds will be moved to this line item to get it started then will be sustained by member giving alongside their contributions to our general fund.

This ministry is not intended to replace our support of Doorstep or Operation Food Secure, but will instead supplement those networks. The food items to be stocked are yet to be determined though they will resemble the food bags we purchased two years ago. We will also have items available for persons who are homeless.

Pr. Andrew is planning to restart our food ministry in November by preparing food boxes to be delivered to some homes in our neighborhood shortly after Thanksgiving. More information on this project will be announced in November.

As we move forward, please share ideas that you may have to support this ministry either financially or in kind. Please call the office, 233-0767, if you have questions or ideas.

Volunteer Literacy Tutor Training Workshop

Volunteers needed to Help Adults with Reading

The Topeka Literacy Council will conduct a two-day tutor training workshop for individuals and organizations wanting to tutor adults in reading and writing. Volunteer tutor trainers at the workshop will cover proven techniques for teaching adults basic literacy and English as a second language. The cost is \$25.00 for the workbook and handout materials (cash, check, or money order; credit cards not accepted). This fee may be waived for some individuals and organizations. The workshop will be held on Saturday, October 23 and Saturday, October 30, 2021, from 9am to 4:45pm each day. New tutors need to attend both sessions.

Materials used and taught in the workshop include **Laubach Way to Reading** for basic reading skills, **Challenger** for review of basic skills and skill building, **Focus on Phonics** for improving recognition of speech sounds, and **Laubach Way to English** for English language learners.
