Pastor's Letter

Trinity Lutheran Church Topeka, KS "Don't be conformed to the patterns of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds so that you can figure out what God's will is what is good and pleasing and mature."-Romans 12:2

During these past two years for many in the church, we have been in a time of wilderness. We didn't know when we would worship together again, who would still be in the pews, or

even what it would look like for us all to be back together. Would the church be transformed forever? Is this just a blip in history and things will return to normal?

The answer for these questions as your historian pastor is that it is somewhere in the middle. Moving out of COVID, things have changed. People can choose to attend in-person or online, some of our loved ones are no longer with us, and we are still having communion in the pews. Moving out of COVID, things are returning to normal. We are getting our ground again by having worship

together, the new church committees are starting to get off the ground, and coffee hour has returned with a bit of fresh air from moving it to the front entrance. Yet, this time can seem confusing for many in the congregation. Are we back to normal or is this the new "normal"?

This will be our challenge over these next couple of months. We will have to ask ourselves serious questions: What will our church look like? What will our church do together? What will define us as a community of followers? Ultimately, we will have to ask ourselves what is the next chapter for us. What is our post-COVID existence and how will we make an impact in this world by our faith. As Paul states above, this is not a time to conform, but it is a time for us to be transformed. It is a time for us to open our hearts and minds for what the Lord is calling us to do this day.

Council Highlights April 11

- To open the meeting Council had a moment of silence to remember Vickie Jacobs
- Howard Reece was chosen as vice-president. There is still one vacant council position.
- Financials were reviewed by Pr. Andrew. To meet monthly budgeted expenses \$8,844 is needed in general fund. In March \$7,195 was received. This is an improvement over January. May 29 is a fifth Sunday, which Council has designated a 5th Sunday Special for Camp Tomah Shinga. July's 5th Sunday will be a "Budget Booster" with special offering going to the general fund.
- ◆ Pr. Andrew spoke about the pledging for the Capital Campaign. To date 10 pledges have been received. This is not adequate to raise \$90,000 over a three year period to qualify for matching funds if Trinity is approved for placement on the historical register. It was decided to move forward with the approval process for placement on the historical register.
- ◆ Synod Assembly is June 9 11 in Olathe. Diane Bottorff is willing to attend but still need at least one more person. We are allowed two voting members and anyone may go as a non-voting member.
- Pr. Andrew presented three resolutions that will be pre-

- sented at the Assembly. Two of the resolutions are related to LGBTQ issues, and he asked council if they would agree to have Trinity sign-on as one of the co-sponsors of these two resolutions. Council approved. The third resolution has an environmental focus and supports reduction of greenhouse gas by 2035.
- ◆ Community relations:
 Service Sunday is being
 planned for June. Date to be
 determined. Time will be Sunday afternoon after worship to
 volunteer at Doorstep.
 Partnering with NIA to sponsor outdoor events during summer such as movie night and
 yard games.
- Maintenance: Howard reported that a tree limb fell on the roof of Trinity Hall causing holes in the roof. Repair has been done by JB Turner Co. Community Garden: Howard reported that gardeners lead by NIA members Kathryn and Gavin are asking for repairs to the water hydrant. Cair Paravel students are using two of the raised beds.
- There was a request to hold a flute/piano recital in our sanctuary Sunday afternoon, May
 The teacher is known by
 Loretta Hoerman. Council approved this request.

Doorstep

I'm sure we all thought more than two years into this pandemic that we would be 'normal' again. If we didn't think it, we surely hoped! And, yet, here we are. As much as we would like to return to pre-COVID ways of providing services at Doorstep, we aren't there yet. But we continue providing food, clothing, household items, rent, utilities, prescriptions, pet food, hygiene kits, diapers, dental and gas vouchers, and local bus tickets by appointment or via phone intake.

It would be wonderful to have an Annual Banquet and Quilt Drawing again, perhaps sometime this year we will feel comfortable having these events and celebrating our dedicated volunteers and Doorstep!

We will have **Christmas in July** focusing on specific donations, and our **3rd Summer Cash Bash** with matching funds already secured! Speaking of matching funds... our wonderful supporters and donors met the **HVAC Match Challenge**

in less than 3 weeks' time! And, while that didn't get us all the way to the goal line, we have received additional funds, and pledges, that will get us to the \$180,000 budget for the new HVAC system!! YAY! We have signed the contract to lock in prices, the equipment has been ordered, and we expect to start the project in mid-September. We cannot thank all of those who donated to this special project. We have been blown away by the generosity of so many who believe in the mission of Doorstep!

Vickie Sue Bowers Jacobs died in Topeka on March 27, 2022, after a brief illness. She was born June 14, 1947, in Fremont, Nebraska to Ray O. and Opal Williams Bowers. She lived in Fremont until 1969, attending Fremont High School and Midland Lutheran College. In 1969, she married Russell Jacobs, and they moved to Austin, Texas for graduate school at the University of Texas. Vickie is survived by her husband of 53 years Russell, of Tecumseh, Kansas; her brother Bill Bowers and wife Midge of Omaha, Nebraska; and two nieces

(Courtney Bowers and Anna Nuckels) and a nephew (Jordan Bowers.) Vickie was a talented artist and an accomplished vocal and instrumental musician, active in those arts in high school and college. She was also a ballet dancer, including a brief stint on the professional stage. With a bachelor's degree in Art Education, she spent most of her professional career in Special Education in Austin and Topeka, KS, where she moved in 1975 when Russell took a teaching job at Washburn University.

She was a passionate and successful hobby breeder of Basenji dogs, and she showed and groomed dogs professionally under the name Cynosure Kennels. She was particularly proud that most of her dogs had not only a conformation championship, but working titles as well. Indeed, a Basenji that she bred was recently inducted into the ASFA Lure Coursing Hall of Fame. She was a contributing member of numerous local, state and regional dog clubs, including the Lawrence Jayhawk Kennel Club, Heartland Coursing Association, the American Sighthound Field Association, and the Basenji Club of America. In her later years, she learned the Chinese martial art Taiji Quan with Chang's Tai Chi Club, and taught the art at Washburn University for 20 years. She was a member of Trinity Lutheran Church in Topeka, and served as Vice-President of the Church Council there.

Vickie was a good friend to many people in the Topeka and Lawrence area, and she will be greatly missed by her family and friends.

A Memorial Service was held on Friday, April 22nd at Trinity Lutheran Church, followed by a reception in the Lobby of the White Concert Hall at Washburn University.
