Trinity Tidings

Pastor's Letter

"See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." - Isaiah 43:19 You might hear people say they don't attend because they think that the church is judgmental. That to be members of the church has something to do with calling out right or wrong, and delivering judgements on the problem. This idea is not without warrant. Starting with the Victorians, manners and morals were highly stressed in society. The manners of the wealthy were to guide the community into being more "civilized" people. Christians started to categorize things as sacred or secular. It became taboo for anything secular to make its way into church. We started to live in a world where we separated life into a box of what we did on Sunday and a box of the rest of our lives.

Yet, this way of thinking about faith does not reflect the ways that Christians think about the world around them. From the start of the church, missionaries would often use secular and even pagan symbols to preach the Gospel. Most famous of these was St. Patrick. According to legend, when St. Patrick was made a slave and sent to Ireland, he learned the Celtic people worshipped the sun as a god. When returning to Ireland later in life, he used that knowledge and created the now familiar Celtic Cross which the Irish made into stone displays of faith. It is the secular and sacred that came together to spread the Gospel to the people.

Martin Luther and Charles Wesley also faced a missionary issue in the church. In their different eras, both found that the church had lost touch with the common people. Luther and Wesley both spent some time at the pub to get to know the world in which

people outside of the church lived. They incorporated ideas that were considered secular into the sacred space of the church. Luther said Latin was not the only language that could be used in church. Wesley brought together common tunes with new religious lyrics to create hymns for which even the dirtiest coal miners would spiff up to sing on Sunday. We see the secular and sacred coming together in the work of these two church leaders. You might ask why the pastor has taken you on this journey. I know this month's God on Broadway series might be very different in several ways. It's based on liturgy from the United Methodist church: can we trust it as Lutherans? It will focus on secular music, and can we have that in church on Sunday of all times? These may be comments made before and during our worship series this month. And I ask those who question this series to think about St. Patrick, Luther, and Wesley. Think about how we separate secular and sacred. Think about how we often use that to be that judgmental church. Then turn your attention to when we embrace the world with our faith and bring together our whole lives by realizing that the secular can be sacred when embraced by the Gospel. Be it a pagan sun, the German language, or worldly songs, God's missionaries have always been able to use the secular to preach the sacred. And we are having a try at doing this during August. Let's take the secular world of the theatre and see how it can relate to the Gospels in new thoughtprovoking ways. I encourage all of you to come along on this journey of worship with us in August and to open your minds to the possibilities of how the gospel can be preached.



Council Highlights July 18

- Reflection on Mission Statement: "Living with Christ's Love". Council was asked to think about how we are living as a community that welcomes all people to join us in prayer, service, study and worship and how we can live this out going forward.
- Howard reported annual boiler inspection has been done and passed, as well as annual inspection of fire extinguishers and safety lights. Two lights will need to be replaced.
- Council resumed work on a balanced budget. There will be a congregational emphasis on Stewardship during September. Financial report at end of

- June shows General Fund behind \$22,000. Budgeted for 2022 to have a negative balance of \$15,000. This adds \$7,000 to our debt on top of the negative balance. Fifth Sunday Special "Budget Booster" on July 31.
- Quilters requested to display a large quilt on a wall in the area near the Buchanan street entrance. Council approved this request.
- As part of the "God on Broadway" theme during worship in August there will be a special appearance of Mary Poppins (Rev. Christian Watkins of Manhattan) on August 28.

Offering envelopes begin to look different starting with 2023 mailings. The logo has been updated and lines have been added for the Restoration Fund and for the Food Pantry.



As a reminder, the Restoration Funds will be kept until they are used for future restoration work in the sanctuary. Please remember that we did not meet our goal for the state restoration grant, but we will proceed with registering the church as a historical property with the state.
