Pastor's Letter

13 People were bringing children to Jesus so that he would bless them. But the disciples scolded them. 14 When Jesus saw this, he grew angry and said to them, "Allow the children to come to me. Don't forbid them, because God's kingdom belongs to people like these children. 15 I assure you that whoever doesn't welcome God's kingdom like a child will never enter it." 16 Then he hugged the children and blessed them. - Mark 10:13-16

Jesus hugged the children and blessed them and I am grateful for the role models who demonstrated the same for me. When I think about people whose legacy has impacted my life, I am extremely grateful that there are too many to name that have brought me to where I am today. To be able to scroll through name after name in my head is a precious gift. I am sure that if you took a moment of your own time, you could spend a good while thinking about the people in your life that have brought you to where you are today. Now, let's be honest for a second while we are strolling down memory lane. There are people that have formed who we are in both positive and negative ways. Those that like Jesus showed us love and those that showed us how not to be like Jesus. I can think of two in my own memories of growing up in a rather conservative church.

One was my Sunday School teacher Mr. Folk who was the love and light of Christ every Sunday morning. He would always open up the church early in the morning and be joyful to have us. He would care about what was happening in our lives and encourage us even when it would get him in trouble. One of those times was when I told him I wanted to learn how to dance and he secretly taught me some line dances over the next couple of weeks in Sunday School (even though dancing was the way of the devil). I still remember him telling me that as long as whatever I did, I did it for the Lord; that God would be ok with a little dancing (after all King David did it a lot). Mr. Folk was one of those figures that believed being the church meant that we loved and cared for our little ones no matter what path God might have for them.

As I have stated, there are also those in our childhood that taught us what it means to not love as Christ. Mrs. Teffteller and her family was the model of human and spiritual advancement in the church—according to her. She was proud to note how well behaved her children were, how well-dressed they would come to church, and that each family should live up to their Christian

standard. She was also not shy about letting the other children know that they needed to improve their ways of being. Mrs. Teffteller often walked around the other children like we were dirty tribal savages from a foreign land that was blessed by her family to educate these humble church hillbillies. Judging was the center of her faith; not the welcoming of Christ.

In our lives in faith, I am certain all of you reading this have ran into a version of Mrs. Teffteller. They might have even been a family member of yours. Yet, the reality is that sometimes we all turn into those people we said we never would. We become the judgmental ones picking teams of who is in or out. We look down on our fellow Christians. We think they are not bound to see the Kingdom of God in the fullness that we do. But being Christ-like is the opposite of this reality. It means to be more like Mr. Folk. To be joyful each Sunday in seeing each other. To embrace a vision of the Kingdom of God to be bigger than we can imagine. To welcome all in Christ's love as a child of God.

Council Highlights

 Signs on entrance doors with COVID precautions will be removed and replaced with signs stating use of mask and hand sanitizer is needed if having respiratory symptoms or recent exposure to COVID positive person.

 Continued discussion of Pr. Andrew's proposal to cut his hours back to Sundays only starting in September.

Committee reports:

- Congregational Life Sunday School (adult and youth) – needs to involve others in leadership as plans for transitioning pastoral leadership is nearing. Discussed working with Community Relations committee to reach out and invite/inform others about Trinity.
- Community Relations Working with Doorstep to set-up a Sunday afternoon volunteer time for us in early Fall. Community Garden has 17 new beds with 2 of those being handicap accessible and enriched dirt has been delivered and placed in each bed.
- Central States Synod Assembly held virtually June 3 – Diane Bottorff and Marcy Carlson were our voting members. Diane gave a summary of assembly highlights: Bishop Candea spoke on the assembly theme—Together

Traveling the Way of Jesus. We are united with Christ in baptism and in this relationship we ground our actions, our ministry, and our purpose as faith communities. A significant challenge over the past year has been the closure of six congregations in our synod and the disaffiliation of two congregations from the ELCA. In her message ELCA Bishop Eaton stated that ELCA has set a goal to reach one million new, young and diverse people. Younger and more diverse people are disproportionately missing from our pews and gatherings. Proposed budget for 2024 was adopt-

ed. Contributions from congregations has declined making it necessary to adjust budget for current year (2023). Assembly offering designated for the four campus ministries in our synod and resolution passed to Create a Synod Campus Ministry Team.

Other resolutions included: Global Mission Awareness; Development of Mission Partnership support with support of the Gathering Table in Kansas City; Support of Chaplaincy Endowment of Bethany Village in Lindsborg with a special offering in November.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

In place of the Adult Sunday School on July 9th at 9:45am, we will have a learning session for those that might step forward to be leaders in ensuring our Children's Sunday School continues. Pastor Andrew will teach the basics behind how to plan for Messy Church and we will select the lesson for the following Children's Sunday School to do together on July 23rd.





I believe it is true that the older we get, the faster time seems to go by! It is summertime in a new year already! Which means, Christmas will be here before we know it! We started Christmas in July many years ago to help alleviate some of the strain of providing gifts during the holiday season for more than 800 of our neighbors in need in the 260 households Doorstep will adopt this December from the Christmas Bureau.

In 2022, Doorstep assisted 259 households involving 820 individuals with Christmas gifts, food, health kits, school supplies, blankets, clothing, and gift cards. Each year we adopt families and individuals who meet the income requirements to be able to apply with the Christmas Bureau. We have created our 'wish list' based on the items our families requested last Christmas. Our focus for Christmas in July is non-seasonal items that should be available this time of year.

Each school aged child we adopt receives school supplies and a backpack, and each household receives a blanket, and a health kit filled with full-sized hygiene products, and wrapped with a new bath towel, hand towel and washcloth! Each child receives one bigger toy as their gift, and other smaller items are available along with games, books, stuffed animals, stocking stuffers etc.


