Hello Partners in Ministry,

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Transition Consultant Report — Surveys

A critique that was voiced early on in the process is that doing processes in person was excluding a segment of the congregation who could not make it to in-person gatherings. We heard that loud and clear, and so crafted two surveys sent to congregation members to complete and return. I hope you all availed yourselves of the opportunity! We learned a few new things, and I hope gave everyone an opportunity to voice the qualities they are looking for in their next pastor.

The first survey form was titled "Who Are We This Sunday?" Originally designed to be done on a Sunday morning with those in attendance, we chose to send it out, and as such the survey serves as a way of collecting and confirming demographic data. Fifty-three surveys were mailed out after identifying active and potential active households. These included mailings to those as far away as Olathe who continued to self-identify as being connected to Trinity Lutheran.

Twenty-three surveys were returned, or just a little shy of 50% participation rate. (An excellent return rate on a mailed survey is considered 40%, so tracking higher than usual return.) Of more concern is the number of households identified to survey. More about that later.

The first question was demographic in nature, as we asked people to identify members of their household and ages. A total of **34 individuals** were identified. Here is the breakdown of ages and self-identified gender.

As you can see (and no surprises here), Trinity's membership tracks older and females outnumber males. Of particular concern is the concentration of membership in the 65+ category, for a variety of reasons, but chief among the concerns becomes sustainability and viability; as the congregation ages there are fewer younger folks to take up tasks, leadership and the workload.

On the positive side, people in this age group are the most committed to institutions and are likely to remain highly committed to support and participation.

The next questions identified racial and ethnic identity. No surprise here either, the majority of respondents were Caucasian and English speakers as primary language. The average commute time for individuals to Trinity is 10 to 20 minutes. This question attempts to give you a snapshot of how connected a congregation is to the neighborhood or community. The greater the commute time for members, the more you have members who are no longer living in the immediate neighborhood and are therefore disconnected from nearby relationships.

The #1 reason why a person visits or connects with a church is still via personal invitation. There is a difference however, between and invitation of "I go to church over there, join me on Sunday!" and an invitation of "I go to church at 8th and Buchanan, here, let me draw you a map."

Which invitation is more likely to get a favorable response? Which one will be followed up on?

The next question allowed people to identify how long they had been connected to or a member of Trinity. Again, no big surprises here. One member identified as being here less than a year. One for 1-3 years. The remainder of the respondents (41) indicated they had been here 10+ years.

The positive in that finding is a certain measure of stability. The negative is that stable memberships tend to be hard to break into by new attenders. Patterns are established and there are a lot of assumptions about everyone just knowing how things work (or are supposed to work!) which becomes frustrating for those new to an organiza-

tion.

Attendance patterns indicate that you have as many people here more than once a week (9) as you have here less than once a month (also 9), with 5 respondents saying 2-3 times a month. No grand conclusions can be made from those numbers, except to note that at Trinity (as it the case in most smaller congregations) a relatively small number of people end up carrying the weekly burden of care for the building and activities.

Finally, (and again, unsurprising for a small congregation) you have a high rate of people who identify as being related to other members or who identify as close friends with other members. This simply reinforces that Trinity's main attractor is not to be found in programmatic activities, but rather in relationship ties.

The second survey form as entitled "Gifts for Ministry." On this form we invited members of households to have conversations together and then from the provided list, identify the **top five gifts** that were a top priority for your new leader to have. We also then asked households to identify the **top five very helpful gifts** for the new leader to have.

I asked households to do this form in conversation with one another so that they could have the conversation of what they are looking for in a pastor. Quite often that is a more valuable conversation to have within households than as a congregation in general.

The **Top Five Gifts** identified were: Effective Communicator – 18 Provide Pastoral Care – 14 Effective Teacher – 9 Bring Joy and Good Humor – 8 Be able to share leadership – 8

The **Top Five Helpful** identified were: (Three were "ties" so that is expressed here.)

Build a Sense of Community -12Be Able to Share Leadership -12Be effective working with youth -- 8 Deal effectively with conflict -8Help others develop their leadership -7

Have a strong commitment to Lutheran Church – 7

These will be noted on the Ministry Site Profile (MSP) as the characteristics the people of Trinity selfidentified.

An observation from the point of view of the consultant is just a question for all of you to ponder. Under both the "Gifts" and "Helpful" categories, you identify the desire for someone who will share leadership. This is laudable, as it indicates your own desire to be equipped for ministry and to share in the tasks of ministry. However, there is another way that can be interpreted based on your demographics. It will be important for you to clearly identify the difference between shared leadership and matters of control.

Are you a "permission-granting" congregation, where people are free to experiment and try new things? In this scenario, shared leadership means people want to be part of decision making in order to join with it. "Let us know what is coming, so we can help!" Or, are you more of a



"permission-denying" congregation, where shared leadership means that things should not be attempted unless thoroughly vetted by the controlling stakeholders? "Let us know what you are planning on doing, and we'll tell you if we approve of that."

Just something to ponder as you begin to look for that one whom God is surely preparing for you!

Next Steps: The Transition Team will be meeting to begin incorporating your answers and their findings into the Ministry Site Profile in the next few weeks.

Once the Transition Team has completed their research work and entered the information into the system, the document will be passed to the Council who will provide their input in terms of goals, budgetary considerations, and a lead paragraph describing the ministry site and needs.

After the Council reviews and puts their work into the document, it will be available in the church office for members to look at and review.

Finally, the document will "go live" after review by Pastor Dave Whetter at the Synod Office, and that lead paragraph will be available nation wide for Rostered Leaders to see and consider. Then the Bishop's office will begin looking in earnest for options of how best to address Trinity's unique needs.

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This month we begin our 58th year of neighbors helping neighbors! Congratulations to our Volunteer of the Year Award Winners: Jackie, Mitchell, Julia, Brenda, Sharon, and Shirley! We truly could not function without the assistance of all our volunteers!

The need for food assistance has remained high so far this year. In the first 4 months of 2024, we provided 51,370 pounds of food in 918 food orders feeding 2,303 individuals.

The Doorstep Executive Committee has begun work with Coneflower Consulting on a new Strategic Plan. Our current plan, which has been worked on and revised over the past several years, is nearly complete; and it is time to begin looking forward to where we want Doorstep to be in the future. As part of this process, we will have surveys for people to complete online and provide feedback to show trends on what people think are our strengths / weaknesses in our services, as an agency, and more. We want as many people as possible to complete the surveys to provide us with feedback from our community, congregations, donors, volunteers, clients, etc. As we begin our strategic planning retreats to do the work required in crafting our new plan, we want and need to know what people think. The surveys will be live from the last part of May through mid-June. We will send survey links to our member congregations, place on our website, Facebook, etc. Please take time to fill out all the surveys which are appropriate for you.
